


Q5 What is your age?






Q8 What are the TOP 5 climate change issues that will impact on your marae, hapū, iwi or hāpori over the next 10 years?

Q9 How well do you think your marae, hapū, iwi or hāpori will be able to adapt on its own from problems caused by climate change?










Q14 What actions proposed by the Climate Change Commission do you agree with? (Please check all that apply)






