

NOTICE OF PERMISSIONS GRANTED UNDER SECTION 68 OF THE CROWN ENTITIES ACT

1. The purpose of this letter is to provide notice to the Board of my decision to grant permission, in accordance with s 68 of the Crown Entities Act 2004 (the Crown Entities Act), to Commissioners Dr Harry Clark, Ms Catherine Leining, Ms Lisa Tumahai, Professor James Renwick, Professor Nicola Shadbolt and Dr Judith Lawrence to continue work on the Climate Change Commission's Emissions Budget Advice (the current advice) notwithstanding that they have interests relating to that advice, in accordance with s 68 of the Crown Entities Act 2004 (the Crown Entities Act).

Crown Entities Act requirements for managing interests

- 2. As the Board is aware, the Crown Entities Act sets out the requirements for managing the interests of board members of crown entities. This includes the Climate Change Commissioners.
- 3. Section 62 of the Act sets out when a Commissioner will be "interested in a matter before the Commission". This includes where the Commissioner:
 - 3.1 \may derive a financial benefit from the matter;
 - is the spouse, civil union partner, de facto partner, child, or parent of a person who may derive a financial benefit from the matter;
 - 3.3 may have a financial interest in a person to whom the matter relates;
 - is a partner, director, officer, board member or trustee of a person whom may have a financial interest in a person to whom the matter relates;
 - 3.5 may be interested in the matter because the entity's Act so provides; or
 - 3.6 is otherwise directly or indirectly interested in the matter.

- 4. Section 62 also outlines when a Commissioner will not be interested in a matter, including most relevantly:
 - 4.1 if his or her interest is so remote or insignificant that it cannot reasonably be regarded as likely to influence him or her in carrying out his or her responsibilities under the Act or another Act; or
 - 4.2 only because he or she had past or current involvement in the sector, industry or practice.
- 5. Where it is established that a Commissioner is interested in a matter before the Commission, s 66 of the Act provides that the Commissioner:
 - 5.1 must not vote or take part in any discussion or decision of the board or any committee relating to the matter, or otherwise participate in any activity of the commission that relates to the matter; and
 - 5.2 must not sign any document relating to the entry into a transaction or the initiation of the matter; and
 - 5.3 is to be disregarded for the purpose of forming a quorum of the part of meeting of a board or committee during which discussion or decision relating to the matter occurs or is made.
- 6. Notwithstanding the requirements of s 66 of the Act, s 68 provides that the Chair (or where required, the Deputy Chair or responsible Minister) may, by prior written notice to the board, permit Commissioners who have an interest in a matter before the Commission to do anything otherwise prohibited by section 66, where the Chair is satisfied that it is in the public interest to do so.
- 7. Where permission to continue to act is granted under s 68, conditions may also be imposed.

Commissioners' interests and permissions granted

- 8. It has been established that each of the Commissioners have interests that relate to the current advice.
- 9. The fact that such interests would arise was to be expected. The Commissioners have been appointed to the Commission due to their various areas of expertise related to climate change mitigation and adaptation and continue to hold roles within their respective fields. Some areas of overlap between the Commissioners' personal interests and the Commission's work was therefore inevitable.
- 10. It has however been necessary for me to consider, in accordance with s 68 of the Crown Entities Act, whether it is in the public interest for each of the Commissioners to be granted permission to continue working on the advice notwithstanding their interests and, where permission is granted, whether any conditions are required.
- 11. My decision-making in this regard is set out in the Appendix to this letter. In accordance with the notification requirement in s 68(1) of the Crown Entities Act, the Appendix outlines the following in respect of each of the Commissioners' interests:

- 11.1 my assessment of whether it is in the public interest for the relevant Commissioner to be granted permission to continue to act notwithstanding the interest; and
- 11.2 any conditions imposed.

I am satisfied that the interest is able to be managed and that accordingly, it is in the public interest to grant Ms Tumahai permission to continue to work on the advice in accordance with s 68 of the Crown Entities Act, with appropriate conditions in place. Bathurst Resources Ltd is a coal mining company. With respect to Ms Tumahai's husband's interests in Bathurst, all Board members are to be specifically advised of this interest, so as to ensure that Board discussions are properly informed. I note that this is not the approach that has been taken to some other direct financial interests of Commissioners, for example interests in New Zealand Units, where the relevant Commissioner has effectively been excluded from discussions and decisionmaking. With respect to Ms Tumahai's husband's interests in NZIMMR, the Commission's advice could potentially affect minerals generally and NZIMMR's investment in Research and Development Funding (R&D).
