

Have your say on the Climate Commission's Draft Advice

This year the New Zealand government will set emissions-reduction goals for the next 15 years and begin work towards these goals.

On 1 February, the Climate Change Commission issued draft advice to the government on what goals they should set and what policy changes they should prioritise. They recommend reducing net emissions by 36% over the next 15 years, with a range of measures including:

- Banning the import of internal-combustion engine light vehicles by 2035
- Increasing the proportion of travel by walking (25%), cycling (90%) and public transport (120%)
- Achieving 99% renewable energy
- No new installations of gas and coal heating, *increase clean wood burners*
- Diverting organics from landfill
- Reducing ~~sheep and~~ cow numbers by 15%
- ~~A huge tree planting programme, including 25,000 hectares of native forests annually.~~

The Commission is seeking public feedback on its advice.

I feel concerned that the goals set by the Climate Commission are not what the IPCC has stated in its special report 2018 to give us a good chance at staying below global average temperature of 1.5°C. The Climate Commission has advised that 0.4% reductions in NZ's emissions occur in the 15 years left from 2035 to ~~2050~~ 2050. This is an impossible task for the next generation to deal with. The IPCC says it is very important to do the big changes early, rather than later. I ask that under the Official Information Act that the Climate Commission makes its goals abundantly clear - if we stick to the goals given, what global temperature is this likely to give. Is it 2-3°C increase? or worse? We need a Citizens Assembly, to give the public a say in our future. This will allow a random selection of public to hear expert advice & make an informed decision & give political mandate to bring about transformative changes.

Follow EU's lead. For example Ireland is committing 20% of its transport budget to provide safe facilities for active transport.

We need to change to regenerative farming practices & change to plant based diets & clean water. Lab meat & plant substitute meats will replace the meat industry to a large part. There are many alternative foods we could produce - eg. high value mushrooms, seaweeds, chestnuts & other nuts etc.

We need a policy like Cycle Scheme (UK) to fund employees into e-bikes/bikes & EVs that are based on tax breaks relative to income. The subsidies should not be based on fossil fuel vehicle sales. Also we need other light EVs - covered e-bikes & small electric cars are becoming available.

The NZ government should vote for international law of ecocide at the International Criminal Court. Large scale destruction of ecosystems should be illegal.

The NZ government should follow the Dasgupta Biodiversity Economic report. We need a systems change in the way we value nature and run our economy.

We are in a biodiversity, social, economic & climate emergency. We need a holistic approach, which requires systems change of how we run our economy.
