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I am grateful for the work of the Climate Change Commission. New Zealand's action on climate change up to today have been less impressive and ambitious than I had hoped. Compared to many countries of similar affluence, our achievements have been modest.

I support the draft targets in general, although I believe the targets could be more ambitious, particularly in the dairy and agriculture sector.

I support increased taxation to allow a transition justly to a low carbon economy. New Zealand could readily subsidise removal of internal combustion engines and provide subsidies and incentives to support the use of renewable transport technologies (battery cars, electric bicycles) as well as improved low carbon infrastructure (e.g. railways).

Our transition to a low carbon economy needs to be done on the basis that the poor, needy and vulnerable are not further disadvantaged. We should treat this challenge as the opportunity to stimulate the post-COVID economy with a green new deal. New Zealand as a small, developed country is well positioned to be a global leader and example to other countries.

We should not seek to out source our emissions with carbon credits to other countries.

I am prepared to make changes to my life to support bold action on climate change.

I request that targets are set to ensure less than 1.5 deg of global warming with goals of underachieving being restrained by adjustments based on scientific input if global warming accelerates.

Have your say on the Climate Commission's Draft Advice

This year the New Zealand government will set emissions-reduction goals for the next 15 years and begin work towards these goals.

On 1 February, the Climate Change Commission issued draft advice to the government on what goals they should set and what policy changes they should prioritise. They recommend reducing net emissions by 36% over the next 15 years, with a range of measures including:

- Banning the import of internal-combustion engine light vehicles by 2035
- Increasing the proportion of travel by walking (25%), cycling (90%) and public transport (120%)

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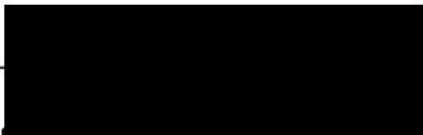
