We should be setting targets that minimise the chance of exceeding 1.5°C . Preferably by following a ~~path~~ pathway (cf Fig 4.4) that is close to the interquartile / upper quartile boundary with reductions exceeding 60%.

~~You provide no citation~~ I was unable to find discussion / assessment of tipping points. Yet over the last decade we have seen growing evidence of their emergence much earlier than was thought a decade ago. Avoidance of pathways that might trigger tipping points is an additional reason to be more aggressive in our reductions.

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Please explain your answer (1000 word limit):

If EU and UK can commit to 55% and 68% respectively, then we should be in that range too. Our position as 24th richest per capita puts us on par with UK and in the midst of the richer EU nations, ~~also on par~~ this is my rationale for committing to an NDC which aligns with the most recent commitment for these countries.

This year the New Zealand government will set emissions-reduction goals for the next 15 years and begin work towards these goals.

On 1 February, the Climate Change Commission issued draft advice to the government on what goals they should set and what policy changes they should prioritise. They recommend reducing net emissions by 36% over the next 15 years, with a range of measures including:

- Banning the import of internal-combustion engine light vehicles by 2035
- Increasing the proportion of travel by walking (25%), cycling (90%) and public transport (120%)
- Achieving 99% renewable energy
- No new installations of gas and coal heating
- Diverting organics from landfill
- Reducing sheep and cow numbers by 15%
- A huge tree planting programme, including 25,000 hectares of native forests annually.

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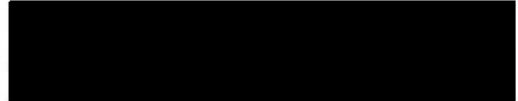
