

Have your say on the Climate Commission's Draft Advice

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On 1 February, the Climate Change Commission issued draft advice to the government on what goals they should set and what policy changes they should prioritise. They recommend reducing net emissions by 36% over the next 15 years, with a range of measures including:

- Banning the import of internal-combustion engine light vehicles by 2035
- Increasing the proportion of travel by walking (25%), cycling (90%) and public transport (120%)
- Achieving 99% renewable energy
- No new installations of gas and coal heating
- Diverting organics from landfill
- Reducing sheep and cow numbers by 15%
- A huge tree planting programme, including 25,000 hectares of native forests annually.

The Commission is seeking public feedback on its advice.

Anglicans across our region will make our voices heard.

We have contributed more emissions per capita than many other countries, so our response should be commensurate. Delaying action shifts the burden to future generations and that is not fair. Further, we should not achieve our goals by paying other countries to plant trees for us. We need to reduce emissions here instead.
- I support a just transition. Those who can most afford to pay for the transition should bear most of the expense. Those that are most vulnerable in this transition need to be supported. As a society we need to look out for individuals, communities and businesses that are most affected and support them in the transition to a low carbon economy.
- Please ensure that all New Zealand's commitments are consistent with doing our bit to keep warming within 1.5 degrees.
- I realise that everyone is going to have to make changes to achieve the outcomes we need. I am willing to play my part and I support bold action.

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I agree with the attached recommendations in principle. However, paraplegic & eldest people with medical conditions difficult to achieve, main focus is increasing public transport, including buses & trains, so as to minimize private car use.



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Dr Mike Joy more than adequately covers matters on Dairying and Cattle production generally. Livestock including sheep should be reduced by at least 40% if any meaningful impact is to be made on combating nitrification and siltation of waterways and subterranean water supplies.

I am in favour of an enhanced level of tree planting and carbon credits sold to externally owned companies for new Zealand owned forested land should be banned.

Coal and gas for power generation should be reduced and nuclear power generation should be seriously considered.

Electric vehicles, particularly hybrid vehicles should be actively promoted. .

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I realise that these changes will be a cost to everyone, but it will become more difficult if changes are deferred or relayed. Lets do it now, and do it right!

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
